Vista Green: Phase 1

We're so excited to share that Phase 1 of Vista Green is almost entirely finished! The first 7 homes in Phase 1 are complete and have received Certificates of Occupancy. The last two are in final stages of finishing work, receiving trim and final inspections. Families have moved into six of the nine homes, and we are seeing the beginnings of the Vista Green community come together!

Vista Green: Phase 2

Exciting things are happening in Phase 2 of Vista Green! The first three homes are fully framed out with roofs installed. Footings and foundations for the final six homes will be going in the beginning of October. We hope to frame as many of the final six as we can before winter! Homeowner Partners have been selected for six of the nine homes in Phase 2.

During his tenure, Dale volunteered with Lakeshore Habitat 445 times, worked on 68 different projects, and completed over 3,000 volunteer hours. Statistically, children of homeowners are 116% more likely to graduate from college. Homeownership also leads to better test scores and higher high school graduation rates, especially among children of lowincome homeowners.

What a joy and privilege to see firsthand the impact that home can have. We are so thankful for the small role we got to play in Holly's story, and we can't wait to see where she ends up and what impact she will have on the world around her. Homeownership benefits everyone, and what a beautiful example of the strength, stability, and self-reliance that home can provide. Meet Holly. Holly recently graduated from Holland High School where she played several sports, was on student council, and in National Honor Society. She thrived academically and made the most of her time in high school, ultimately receiving a full-ride scholarship to University of Michigan to study Environmental Engineering, where she's studying now.

Holly is also the daughter of Lakeshore Habitat homeowners, Quincy (current City of Holland councilman) and Sara, and has lived in a Habitat home since 2010. 
